# Nurse Celebrates Retirement With Gift That Spotlights Her 23 Years at RCH

Donors discover Redlands Community Hospital (RCH) in a variety of ways—sometimes through the death of a loved one, other times through their own personal illness, and often inadvertently. Chikako Gray's journey began in Japan. Born and raised in Japan, Chikako graduated from the St. Luke's College of Nursing in Tokyo and worked as a registered nurse on a pediatric unit in that city for two years. While there, she met her husband, who was serving in the U.S Air Force, and the two were married. They had three children before relocating from Tokyo to East Highland and later Beaumont in 1989.

When her daughter started school, Chikako decided to return to work. After working as a certified nursing assistant she was hired on the 3200 Telemetry Unit, or Definitive Observation Unit, at Redlands Community Hospital in 2001.

"A couple of my classmates were working at the hospital and I felt comfortable there," she said. "The woman who hired me looked at my resume, saw that I had been a nurse in Japan, and encouraged me to seek licensing as a registered nurse in the U.S. I became an RN in 2004 and continued working on the Telemetry Unit for 23 years."

When the recent pandemic hit, all Covid patients were admitted on the third floor, where Chikako worked. Many were critically ill and intubated and were ultimately transferred to the Intensive-Care Unit. As Chikako and the other staff worked diligently to save them, they could not help but feel sad and sympathetic for those who were struggling.


"I saw how much money the hospital spent during Covid and I wanted to give something back," she said. "When I retired in 2024, I decided I'd like to contribute to the 3200 Telemetry Unit, which is a comprehensive unit and one that is challenging for the nursing staff. I really appreciate all that I was taught there and the many opportunities I was given to grow during the last 23 years. I enjoyed working with everyone, providing excellent care with compassion and integrity, and I wanted to help the staff continue to grow and provide wonderful care for their patients."

With that in mind she recently donated \$2,300 to the Redlands Community Hospital Foundation—\$100 for each of the 23 years she worked at the hospital. It was not her first gift—she began donating to RCH during the Covid pandemic and has given generously several times since then.

"Redlands Community Hospital means a lot to the people who live in the community," said Chikako, who often assisted stroke patients when she worked at RCH. "The hospital is a Thrombectomy Capable stroke center, and the quick, accurate diagnosis and treatment of patients has saved many lives while preventing serious disabilities."

Even though she's retired, Chikako still considers RCH her family's hospital. "I trust the doctors there and I trust the rest ofthe hospital staff," she said. "Everyone is so compassionate, not only toward the patients but toward their families. Even though I'm retired I'd like to continue to support the hospital in the future."

# Redlands Couple Turns Hospital Tours Into Action With Gifts Supporting ER, Cancer Center

As Lake Arrowhead residents, Tom and Julie Cutler gladly supported their local hospital. They saw the good that a community hospital can do, stepped forward and enthusiastically became involved.

In 2010 they moved to Redlands, and decided to support another local medical center: Redlands Community Hospital. They're glad they did. "When we lived in Lake Arrowhead we were active with a small hospital there and we realized how important a community hospital is," Tom said. "When we moved to Redlands, the community hospital concept went with us."

Tom and Julie are both native Southern Californians—he attended Menlo College and she a local community college. Tom writes insurance for religious organizations, while Julie describes herself as a "muralist"—having painted in homes, hospitals, restaurants and other locations.

They first gave philanthropically in 2016, supporting the Emergency Department expansion and renovation with a major gift. However, it was after that when the hospital's value to Redlands and the surrounding areas came into sharp focus. "It really became important to me when I had a diverticulitis attack on Christmas night of 2020, right in the middle of Covid," Tom said. "There were tents and patients outside and

I've never seen people work so hard to take care of people in my life under impossible conditions—there was nobody walking, staff were running all the time. They had to—there were so many people in dire straits. I really became a believer in our local community hospital at that point."

Prior to that the couple had toured the Emergency
Department. It was then that they decided to support an exam room in the new facility. "We had no idea how the hospital works and how interesting everything was," said Julie, who at one point was treated in the Emergency Department for a foot injury. "We got a chance to look behind the curtain and see the opportunities that were there to eventually support the Cancer Center."

During COVID especially but even today, when you drive by the hospital it appears like a pleasant building with many trees. However, when you enter the front door, everything changes! So much activity, staff comforting and helping the patients. Both large and small miracles happening every day.

They liked what they saw. The Cutlers are currently in the process of providing another major gift, this time to support the new Radiation Oncology Center. Tom's mother suffered with cancer, so the gift seems appropriate. "I thought, 'That's where I'd like to help out,'" Tom said.

Their support hasn't stopped there. Tom also is on the hospital's committee for the annual Redlands Community Hospital Foundation Golf Classic for the Ken Corwin Cup; he runs the putting contest, which each year makes available more than \$10,000 in prize money.

"After touring the hospital and seeing all of the advanced technology, the hospital is very reassuring to us," Tom said. That success is in large part due to the Redlands Community Hospital Foundation, the hospital's fundraising arm. "The Foundation is very important," Tom said. "It's really critical that it continues to help the hospital upgrade technology so that care remains at a premium. The hospital is indispensable. It is so important to become involved at Redlands Community Hospital."

### Philanthropic Support from Redlands-based Esri Helping to Transform Cancer Care at RCH



Esri, a Redlands-based leader in GIS software recently provided a substantial and transformational gift in support a new Radiation Oncology Center at Redlands Community Hospital. This gift will provide access to the latest technologies in cancer radiation treatments close to home for patients and families in the Inland Empire. Cancer care close to home is becoming a reality. Esri's gift reflects the company's and Jack and Laura Dangermond's longstanding commitment to the Redlands community.

#### A New Radiation Oncology Center at RCH

Redlands Community Hospital (RCH) is home to some of the most exciting innovations in cancer screening, detection and treatment. The Nancy Varner Center for Women's Health shines as a beacon in the Inland Empire for success in early breast cancer screening. A new 8,000 sq. foot Center for Cancer Care opened in June 2022 boosting infusion therapy capacity and connecting cancer patients with a network of physicians, social workers and other members of their cancer care team. The Center for Cancer Care was partially funded with philanthropic support from the community.

Cancer patients in the Inland Empire who require cancer diagnostic services and radiation therapy treatments are seeking access to the advanced services in these critical areas of cancer care close to home. To provide our patients with access to some of the latest innovations and

technologies in cancer radiation treatments, RCH will build a new Radiation Oncology Center directly across the street from the main hospital, at 245 Terracina Blvd. The new Center is expected to open in early 2026.

The new Radiation Oncology Center will house a new innovative Linear Accelerator (LINAC) machine along with a special space for the new PET/CT scanner. This new space will allow for expansion of radiation therapy as the demand for this treatment grows.

#### **Philanthropic Funding for the Project**

As was the case with the Center for Cancer Care, philanthropy will play a major role in helping to ensure the new Radiation Oncology Center becomes a reality. In late 2022, the Redlands Community Hospital Foundation appointed a Steering Committee, chaired by foundation board member Betty Auton Beck, to lead a fundraising initiative for this project. With Esri's gift along with the support of key community members, \$5.6 million has been raised in the recently completed quiet phase of this initiative. # RCH Foundation's 42nd Annual Golf Classic Raised \$220,000 for Radiation Oncology Center



More than 140 golfers teed off at the 42nd Annual Redlands Community Hospital Foundation (RCHF) Golf Classic for the Ken Corwin Cup this week. This year's event held at the Redlands Country Club raised \$220,000 for the new Radiation Oncology Center at Redlands Community Hospital (RCH)

To provide patients with access to the latest innovations and technologies in cancer radiation treatments, RCH will build a new Radiation Oncology Center directly across the street from the main hospital, located at 245 Terracina Blvd. The new Radiation Oncology Center will house a new innovative linear accelerator machine along with a special space for a new PET/CT scanner. This new space, which is expected to open in early 2026, will allow for expansion of radiation therapy as the demand for cancer treatment grows.

The tournament was coordinated by more than 60 dedicated volunteers, including members of the RCH Auxiliary, hospital staff, community members, and Redlands Country Club members.

The event also featured dinner and an auction where guests bid on Los Angeles Angels tickets behind home plate, donated by Tim Rochford and the Rochford Foundation; a luxury suite for 18 at an Angels game, courtesy of Hangar 24 Craft Brewery; a Lake Arrowhead cabin getaway donated by RCH Golf Committee member Tom Cutler, and a whiskey tasting experience donated by RCH Foundation board member Bob Driessnack. The raffles also offered a variety of golf related gifts, including clothing and equipment.

This year's tournament was co-chaired by Wendy and Guenter Posjena, longtime hospital volunteers and donors who have supported many hospital initiatives, including the building of the Redlands Community Hospital Center for Cancer Care.

"Redlands Community Hospital is extremely important to the community and we are grateful for everyone who participated and supported this year's event," said Wendy Guenter Posjena. "Redlands Community Hospital is a special facility in our community that has provided patient-centered care in family-friendly environment."

The Golf Classic attracted nearly 100 sponsors, including Madison Grove Post-Acute, SEI, Lockton Insurance Brokers, and the Redlands Community Hospital medical staff. Hatfield Buick returned as the Hole-in-One sponsor, offering participants a chance to win a three-year lease on a new GMC Hummer EV on the par-3 third hole.
